

Get out the vote in **Alabama**

Election Day: November 3

Why should you vote?

Voting is one of the most powerful ways to make your voice heard in our democracy, but in 2016, 43% of the eligible voting-age population (nearly 100 million Americans) did *not* cast a vote for president; and 38.6% did *not* vote for any office.

In 2016, the Black voter turnout rate declined for the first time in 20 years in a presidential election, falling from a record-high 66.6% in 2012 to 59.6% in 2016.

Alabama's absentee and mail-in voting procedures

Permanent absentee / mail-in voting procedures:

- Excuse required to request an absentee ballot

2020 state absentee / mail-in voting status:

- Coronavirus updates: Absentee/mail-in voting eligibility requirements suspended, allowing all voters to cast ballots by mail in the November 3, 2020, general election.

Deadlines to know for voting in Alabama

Voter registration deadline:

October 19, 2020

Fifteen days before an election.

Early in-person voting deadlines:

Alabama does not have early voting, but they do have in-person absentee voting. Voters can request their absentee ballot and cast their in-person absentee ballots at their local absentee ballot office during regular business hours **beginning 55 days before the Election.**

In-person absentee voting **ends 5 days before the Election.**

Absentee / Mail-In voting ballot deadlines:

Request must be received by

October 29, 2020

Five days before the election

Ballot submission deadline:

By mail: Postmarked by November 2, 2020 and received by noon November 3, 2020 (Election Day).

In person: November 2, 2020 by 5:00 pm.

Voter ID Requirements

Unexpired Photo ID at the polls:

- AL Driver's license or Nondriver ID #
- State-Issued ID (AL or any other state)
- Federal-government issued ID including US Passport
- Employee ID from governmental entity of Federal Government or AL
- Student or employee ID from AL post-high school institution
- Military ID
- Tribal ID

or expired less than 60 days

If an eligible voter doesn't have a valid ID and is positively identified by 2 election officials, they can so state in a sworn affidavit so such voter can vote a regular ballot.
